BRET STEPHENS is an op-ed columnist and associate editor at the New York Times, a position he assumed in April 2017. Previously he wrote “Global View,” the foreign-affairs column of the Wall Street Journal, for which he was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for distinguished commentary in 2013. He was also the Journal’s deputy editorial-page editor, responsible for the newspaper’s global opinion section, as well as a member of the editorial board.

Mr. Stephens began his career at the Wall Street Journal in 1998 as an editor in New York, and later wrote editorials and articles for the newspaper from Brussels. In January 2002 he was named editor-in-chief of the Jerusalem Post, a position he assumed at age 28. At the Post, he was responsible for the newspaper’s news, editorial, digital and international editions, and also wrote a weekly column.

Mr. Stephens returned to the Journal in late 2004. He has reported stories from around the world, including Pakistan, Afghanistan, Iraq, Lebanon, Gaza, and interviewed dozens of world leaders. He is a frequent guest on many TV news programs and has published articles in Foreign Affairs, Time, Commentary and many other publications.

Mr. Stephens has twice been chairman of Pulitzer Prize juries and is a national judge of the prestigious Livingston Awards. In 2014 he was awarded the Professional Achievement Prize by the University of Chicago, a distinction he shares with composer Philip Glass, astronomer Carl Sagan, and Nobel laureate Gary Becker.

In 2014 Penguin published his book “America in Retreat: The New Isolationism and the Coming Global Disorder.” Former Secretary of State George Shultz hailed the book as “wise counsel for a constructive, tough-minded, and sensible foreign policy.”

Mr. Stephens was born in New York and raised in Mexico City. He holds a BA with honors from the University of Chicago, an MSc from the London School of Economics, and an honorary doctorate from Niagara University. He lives in Manhattan with his wife Corinna, a classical music and opera critic for the New York Times, and their three children.

NANCY OLIVER GRAY
Doctor of Humane Letters

NANCY OLIVER GRAY has served as president of Hollins University since January 2005. She brought to Hollins a strong belief in the liberal arts and sciences and the need for single-sex colleges in higher education.

Under Gray's leadership, Hollins has implemented a five-year strategic plan with a goal of establishing Hollins as the women's liberal arts college that best unites excellence in liberal arts education with experiential learning opportunities and strong career preparation. *Connecting Liberal Arts Education and Experience to Achieve Results* is focusing the university's efforts through 2018. Other significant accomplishments during Gray's presidency include securing the third highest endowment among members of the Virginia Foundation of Independent Colleges; operating with no debt; and a balanced operating budget for the past ten years. Hollins' financial health earned an "A" rating from Forbes magazine in 2016.

Gray also guided Hollins through the largest comprehensive fundraising campaign in the university's history and the largest ever undertaken by a women's college in the South: the Campaign for Women Who Are Going Places. In 2016, she secured the largest single gift assurance in school history, a commitment of \$20 million arranged by Elizabeth Hall McDonnell, class of 1962, and her husband, James S. McDonnell III. Currently, Gray is leading a challenge to raise \$10 million in gifts and pledges by June 30, 2017; if that goal is reached, an anonymous donor has committed to give Hollins an additional \$5 million.

During her tenure, Gray has collaborated with faculty to introduce new programs, including majors in environmental studies and environmental science; a certificate program in leadership studies; an extensive seminar program for first-year students; Master of Fine Arts degrees in playwriting and children's book writing and illustrating; and the Honors Research Seminars. She has spearheaded an alumnae engagement initiative designed to enhance career preparation for students. In addition, she has overseen renovation of historic buildings and gardens on the Hollins campus. A \$6.5 million renovation of the Dana Science Building is under way to completely renovate biology and chemistry laboratories and faculty offices, refresh other labs and public areas, and create new research space.

Before coming to Hollins, Gray was president of Converse College in South Carolina for five-and-a-half years. A graduate of Vanderbilt University, Gray holds a master of education degree from North Texas State University and completed additional graduate work at Vanderbilt.

Gray serves on the boards of The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, Princeton Theological Seminary, Mill Mountain Theatre, and the Roanoke Symphony Orchestra, and the Advisory Board for the Virginia Tech School of Public and International Affairs. She is also the presidential sponsor for the Virginia Network of American Council on Education's Office of Women in Higher Education. Gray is past chair of the Council of Independent Colleges in Virginia, past vice chair of the Virginia Foundation for Independent Colleges, and has also served as vice chair of the board for resource development for the Board of Directors of the Council of Independent Colleges. In 2015, Roanoke's Taubman Museum of Art presented Gray with the Ann Fralin Award for her contributions to the arts and art education.

A native of Dallas, Texas, she is married to David Maxson and between them they have seven adult children.

THE GAMMON CUP

Given annually in memory of Dr. Edgar G. Gammon, Class of 1905, pastor of College Church 1917–1923, and President of the College 1939–1955, to the member of the graduating class who has best served the College. Character, scholarship, and athletic ability are considered.

THE ANNA CARRINGTON HARRISON AWARD

Given annually to the junior or senior who has shown the most constructive leadership during the school year. The Harrison Award was established through the generosity of the late Mr. Frederick Nash Harrison of Richmond, Virginia, in memory of his mother.

THE SAMUEL S. JONES

PHI BETA KAPPA AWARD

Given by the Eta of Virginia Chapter in recognition of intellectual excellence. The award is made possible by the generosity of the alumnus, Class of 1943, whose name it bears.

THE ALGERNON SYDNEY SULLIVAN MEDALLION

The medallion is given annually in honor of the New York Southern Society's first president, Algernon Sydney Sullivan, by the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Foundation. This award is given to a member of the graduating class distinguished for excellence of character and generous service to his fellows. Other recipients may be chosen from friends of the College who have been conspicuously helpful to the institution in its effort to encourage and preserve a high standard of morals.

THE CABELL AWARD

Given annually to "a Hampden-Sydney faculty member in recognition of outstanding classroom contribution to the education of Christian young men." The Cabell Award was created by the Robert G. Cabell III and Maude Morgan Cabell Foundation to assist the College in attracting and keeping professors of high ability and integrity.

THE THOMAS EDWARD CRAWLEY AWARD

Given in memory of Thomas Edward Crawley, Class of 1941, who served the College as teacher, scholar, musician, and dean from 1946 until 1984, to that professor most distinguished for devoted service to the ideals of Hampden-Sydney College and the education of its sons.

THE SENIOR CLASS AWARD

Given by the Senior Class at Commencement to a member of the College's faculty, administration, or staff who in the eyes of the Class members has contributed during their four years most significantly to the College, its students, and the community.

SENIOR CLASS GIFT

Each year the senior class presents a gift to the College. The goals are to raise \$5,000 and establish an annual scholarship for a student with excellent academic standing and with financial needs. All seniors are encouraged to participate. All seniors who contribute to the Class Gift will be listed in the 2017 Commencement Program.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF HAMPDEN-SYDNEY COLLEGE

Hampden-Sydney College's heritage is deeply rooted in the history of both Colonial America and the Presbyterian Church. The founders of the College chose the name Hampden-Sydney to symbolize their devotion to the principles of representative government and full civil and religious freedom which John Hampden (1594–1643) and Algernon Sydney (1622–1683) had outspokenly supported, and for which they had given their lives, in England's two great constitutional crises of the seventeenth century. They were widely invoked as hero-martyrs by American colonial patriots, and their names were immediately associated with the cause of independence championed by James Madison, Patrick Henry, and other less well-known, but equally vigorous, patriots among the College's early Trustees.

Indeed, the original students eagerly committed themselves to the revolutionary effort, organized a militia company, drilled regularly, and went off to the defense of Williamsburg and of Petersburg, in 1777 and 1778 respectively. Their uniform of hunting shirts—dyed purple with the juices of pokeberries—and grey trousers prefigured the College's traditional colors, garnet and grey.

First proposed in 1771, the College was formally organized in February 1775, when the Presbytery of Hanover, meeting in Nathaniel Venable's Slate Hill plantation (about two miles south of the present campus), accepted a gift of one hundred acres for the College, elected Trustees, and named as Rector (later President) the Rev. Mr. Samuel Stanhope Smith, valedictorian of the Princeton class of 1769, who had been actively promoting the idea of establishing a college in the heavily Scotch-Irish area of south-central Virginia since he began his ministry there in 1772. Within only ten months, Smith, intending to model the new college after his own alma mater, secured an adequate subscription of funds and an enrollment of 110 students. Students and faculty began gathering in the fall of 1775; the first classes were held on November 10. The College completed its first full year in 1776 and has never suspended operations.

In 1783, Hampden-Sydney's viability, severely tested by the Revolutionary War, was ensured by the grant of a charter from the General Assembly of Virginia. Union Theological Seminary of Virginia (1822) was founded at Hampden-Sydney and occupied the south end of the present campus for some seventy-five years before

relocating to Richmond. The Medical College of Virginia was established (1837) at Richmond as the medical department of Hampden-Sydney.

The College matured physically and academically through the first half of the nineteenth century, enjoying the services of some remarkably gifted leaders. Jonathan P. Cushing, a Dartmouth man and the first layman to be president, oversaw the abandonment of the College's original buildings in favor of the handsome Federal architecture which still distinguishes the campus. The world-renowned chemist, Dr. John W. Draper, built the first camera in America and used it to take the world's first astronomical photographs while he was a professor at Hampden-Sydney from 1836 to 1839; he later took the first photograph of a living person.

During the Civil War the students organized a company, with President J. M. P. Atkinson as captain.

Officially named the "Hampden-Sydney Boys," they saw action only in the battle of Rich Mountain (June 10–11, 1861); captured as a body, they were paroled by General McClellan on the condition that they lay down their arms and return to their studies.

After the Seminary moved to Richmond in 1898, a most generous alumnus,

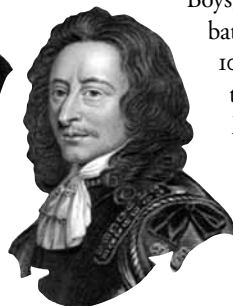
Major R. M. Venable, bought its buildings and gave them to the College.

Throughout the twentieth century, handsome and practical buildings (among them, most recently, as a result of a successful campaign that raised over \$100 million, a new 83,000-square-foot library, a new stadium, and an expanded athletic center, in addition to the ongoing fine arts center renovation and construction of the state-of-the-art Brown Student Center) have been added to the campus, while Hampden-Sydney's academic, social, and cultural programs have been continually enriched and expanded, strengthening the coherent tradition of liberal arts education which remains the hallmark of the College. Its success in forging good men and leaders is widely recognized.

Hampden-Sydney looks into its third century with a wholesome optimism, bred of a sober integrity of mission coupled with a history of sound development, and made possible by an extraordinary succession of leaders and benefactors of rare ability, commitment, and vision.

HAMPDEN-SYDNEY COLLEGE

Hampden-Sydney has been forming good men and good citizens since 1775. Thanks to legendary codes of honor and conduct, a celebrated 40-year-old rhetoric program, and a contemporary liberal arts education featuring supportive, yet exacting faculty, Hampden-Sydney men graduate with the courage to do what is right, the ability to express themselves confidently, and the skill to develop creative solutions for complex problems. In small classes, and within a lasting brotherhood, Hampden-Sydney men embrace challenges in and out of the classroom, learn to lead by assuming responsibility, and develop the self-awareness necessary for forging unique paths. Since before the American Revolution, Hampden-Sydney College has been transforming young men into the best possible versions of themselves, with the moral strength and intellectual capacity to be leaders in the workplace and in their communities.

Located on a 1,300-acre campus in Virginia's beautiful Southside, Hampden-Sydney is one of the oldest colleges in the United States. Charter trustees included Patrick Henry and James Madison; William Henry Harrison was a member of the class of 1791. Ninety-four percent of Hampden-Sydney graduates complete their degree in four years, and the College's alumni network has been ranked among the strongest in the country.

HAMPDEN-SYDNEY COLLEGE COMMENCEMENT TRADITIONS

Hampden-Sydney College Regalia

Today Hampden-Sydney College bachelor's candidates wear a gray gown, as done in 1893, and don a garnet and gray tassel upon their mortarboard. The Dean of Students will turn each graduate's tassel, from the right to the left, just before he processes across the stage. This symbolizes the individual's movement from a degree candidate to a graduate.

Each graduate receiving a diploma today will be hooded. The stripes of the hood lining are Hampden-Sydney garnet and gray with a black exterior and a white or golden yellow facing.

Enter as youth, leave as men: The Bell Tower

Freshmen entering in the fall pass through the Bell Tower's north opening under the inscription, "HUC VENITE IUVENES." On the day of commencement, seniors march as a class through the Bell Tower's south opening under the inscription, "UT EXEATIS VIRI." This tradition, started in 2016, reflects the College's motto, which translates to, "Enter as youths so that you may leave as men."

Champagne Toast

The Class of 2013 were the first to have an official Welcome to the Alumni Toast. The Class of 2017 will be the first to be led by bagpipes to their toast on the patio of the Brown Student Center.

ACADEMIC REGALIA

The pageantry and dress of the academic procession have been inherited from the medieval universities of the 11th and 12th centuries. Academic life as we know it today began in the Middle Ages, first in the Church, then in the guilds. In the teaching guild the master of arts was the teacher and the bachelor was the apprentice of the master; their dress was the outward sign of privilege and responsibility.

Principal features of academic dress are the gown, the cap, and the hood. Since the 15th century, both Cambridge and Oxford have made academic dress a matter of university control, even to its minor details, and have repeatedly published revised regulations. American universities agreed on a definite system in 1895. In 1932 the American Council on Education presented a revised code which, for the most part, governs the style of academic dress today.

The Gown: The flowing gown comes from the 12th century. While it originally may have been worn as a protection against the cold of unheated buildings, today it has become symbolic of the democracy of scholarship, for it covers any dress of rank or social

standing. It is black for all degrees, with pointed sleeves for the bachelor's degree, long closed sleeves with a slit at the arm or wrist for the master's degree, and full bell double sleeves for the doctor's degree. Bachelor's and master's degree gowns have no trimming. For the doctor's degree, the gown is faced down the front with velvet and has three bars of velvet across the sleeves in the color distinctive of the faculty or discipline to which the degree pertains.

The Cap: Under Roman law a freed slave won the privilege of wearing a cap. The academic cap is a sign of freedom of scholarship and the responsibility and dignity with which scholarship endows the wearer. Old poetry records the cap of scholarship as square to symbolize a book. The color of the tassel sometimes denotes the discipline of the degree.

The Doctoral Hood: The doctoral hood is trimmed with one or more chevrons of a second color on the ground of a primary color. The color facing the hood denotes the discipline represented by the degree; the color of the lining designates the university or college from which the degree was granted.
