Information for minors to consider:

- RHET 210 should be taken early on, possibly while co-enrolled in RHET 102.
- RHET 210 should be taken prior to RHET 301, RHET 360 and RHET 370.
- Taking RHET 310 before or while co-enrolled in RHET 360 or 370 is beneficial.
- RHET 360 and RHET 370 are offered each year, but not simultaneously.
- Be aware that ENGL majors have priority in ENGL 380 enrollment. Non-ENGL majors may enroll once ENGL majors have enrolled in the course.
- Students completing the Rhetoric minor who also elect to complete the Creative Writing minor and/or the ENGL major are allowed a one course overlap (RHET 301).
- RHET minors must complete RHET 481 their senior year. It is the responsibility of the student to make sure that the capstone course does not interfere with other obligations. Students should check ahead in Tiger Web and with the director of the RHET program at the very beginning of the senior year to confirm when the capstone course will be offered.
- RHET minors should also consider bolstering their coursework with meaningful co-curricular and summer activities which involve reading, writing, and speaking opportunities such as: tutoring in the Writing and Speaking Centers or in the local schools, working for the Publications Office, participating in the Union Philanthropic Literary Society (UPLS), writing for *The Tiger* or working at the campus radio station, seeking work in the Admissions Office (Garnet and Grey Society), and arranging internships (with the help of the Ferguson Career Center in the Brown Student Center) in journalism or publishing.
- Finally, students interested in a RHET minor should take every available opportunity to develop their writing and speaking abilities. Aim at excellence in every essay you write for classes across the curriculum. Make a habit of speaking up in class so as to become comfortable speaking in public in an extemporaneous or impromptu fashion.
