- Do not take a 400-level course in your first year of the minor, unless advised by your instructor, advisor, or Department chair.
- Minors are encouraged to strike a balance among courses on language, culture, and literature.
- Minors should consider joining the Foreign Language Honors Society, Language Clubs, and participating in the Conversation Table for Advanced Students. Please see your instructor for current meeting times and locations.
