

Important information for PHIL students:

- Interdisciplinary majors involving philosophy may be developed and pursued with the approval of the departments concerned.
- Students who study PHIL develop their critical thinking and analysis skills which enhance their performance in any discipline and career selection; therefore, ALL students are encouraged to take several PHIL courses.
- PHIL is an ideal second "double" major.
 Students selecting PHIL as their second major should consult with a PHIL instructor to assist them with the planning of the major requirements.
- Study abroad experiences are strongly encouraged. Students should start the inquiry process at the end of their freshman year. Visit the Office of Global Education in Blake A 100.
- Students are encouraged to take PHIL 201 early on in the major. It is a time intensive course which requires consistent efforts, but will "revolutionize" the remainder of your academic career.
- If feasible, try to take PHIL 210 in a fall semester followed by either PHIL 211 or PHIL 212 in the spring term of the same academic year.
- Plan ahead to fit PHIL 412/413 (Jr/Sr Sem) into your schedule.
- Make a request to the PHIL department one academic year in advance if you (and others) desire a special topics course to be offered. Independent studies and directed readings courses are always a possibility within the department with sufficient notice.
